IT's a new year and may I wish you all a very happy year.

What would make for a happy year for you? What are your dreams and aspirations for 2023?

Perhaps you want things like Exeter Chiefs to win every game, or your grand children to do well at whatever stage of education they are at; maybe you want to keep well, have good holidays and meet new friends and old, or to take that delayed holiday.

For others the new year may not hold much hope. Some have already experienced the loss of loved ones or have seen their lives change dramatically.

For the Church, the future looks alarming. Will our parishes survive? Will the church survive the social pressures on it to conform to the constantly changing morality? There are many challenges coming to a parish near you.

So where is our hope in this new year? Where can we find real happiness? What are we looking for?

Hope springs eternal we are told. If so, we need, perhaps, to turn to the Eternal for our hope.

The writer to the Hebrews tells us that 'Jesus is the same yesterday today and forever'.

Jeremiah, prophecying at the time that Judah was under attack by Nebachudnezzar (around 571 BC) tells us that God has plans for us, plans for good and not harm. It must have seemed like empty

words for them at the time of siege and the eventual destruction of the city and society. The population was taken into exile. Where is hope? What is Jeremiah on about?

The majority of that generation did not see the return to Jerusalem under Ezra and Nehamiah. For 70 years the people felt no hope, that Jeremiah's words were unfulfilled.

We have just celebrated the coming of the Messiah at Christmas, the hope of the years born as a child. From such an unpromising start, hope grew with his life & teaching but was cut short at Calvary – the two on the road to Emmaus expressed that sense of hope dashed (Luke 24:21).

Yet unexpectedly and miraculously hope was fulfilled at the glorious resurrection. The very thing that robbed all hope from humanity and creation had been overcome and dealt with. Paul has an exaltant passage in his letter to the church in Corinth (1 Corinthians 15:53-57) filled with hope fulfilled: death has been overcome because sin has been overcome.

The world continues on its course; sin continues its rampant way; our year may be happy or difficult, but the Christian hope, fulfilled in Jesus, continues into eternity. Hope is in him alone. I pray that this year you will find true happiness in the only place it can be found, whatever this year may bring to you.

A very busy and fulfilling December!

On the 1st and 2nd of December, well known local florist Sarah Pepper held three very popular fund raising wreath making workshops in the. church. The church had been decorated in advance and looked wonderful. The workshops resonated with folk coming together, having a good time with the sound of chatter and laughter while working.

On Saturday 3rd December, local choir, Cantilena held a concert to raise funds for the very good local cause..Elf.

On Sunday 4th, the annual Christingle service took place. Between 7th and 15th., we hosted Pinhoe school, West Clyst school, Clyst Vale and Broadclyst Primary school while they held their Christmas concerts and Nativities. We opened the church on 12 occasions to accommodate rehearsals and the concerts. The front of the church was packed with an average of 100 children at a time, and many parents and relatives to watch. On several of these occasions we opened the kitchen serving mulled wine and refreshments to raise funds. It has been a opportunity to build relationships with local schools and the feedback has been all very positive.

On Sunday 11th December we held our own Candleight carols and readings. Cantilena and a choir of 50 primary school children took part. The church was lit with hundreds of candles and the service was led by Archdeacon Rev. Andrew Beane. This was very very popular with over 220 in the congregation, and seats were reserved early in advance, resulting in a waiting list with folk queuing to come in on the night.

On Christmas Eve there was an excellent attendance for the popular Crib Service, numbers swelled by the hard work of the Family service team this year.

A day in the life of Licenced Lay Minister

I have been asked to write about a day in the life of a Reader or Licensed Lay Minister (LLM) to give us our preferred title. Perhaps before I go any further it might be helpful to explain how the role of Reader / LLM came about.

The Victorian times experienced a period of rapid industrialisation. As parishes grew, the clergy could not keep pace with demand. Literacy was low so Readers were appointed - men who could lead morning and evening prayer. And ever since the role has been evolving. The role is voluntary – we are not paid, and we are vital to the church's ministry. Of the 27,000 licensed clergy in the UK, 10,000 are LLMs.

Today as LLMs, we are licensed to preach, teach, lead worship and evangelise. We cannot do anything sacramental – communion, baptisms or weddings, but other than that, the sky's the limit. My role is part time and I continue to be a churchwarden at St Mary's Whimple.

Since I was only licensed in October I have yet to fully establish a routine. I have been asked on several occasions if I will be seen more often leading a Sunday service, and I will be doing that about twice a month. But this will not be my focus. Part of the reason for this is that I that I have come to realise that Sunday, with its services and routines is my safe zone, my comfort zone. God does not call us to be comfortable, but to step out in faith. There is a mission field out there, and church life exists from Mondays to Saturdays as well.

These are some of the specific things that I feel called to get involved with.

As a church we are always seeking to build bridges into our community. One of our most precious and important links is that with Whimple Primary School. Since covid restrictions were lifted we have been re-building those links and one way we do this is through Open the

Book. What is Open the Book? It is taking our treasury of wonderful Bible stories and telling them to school children - by simply acting them out. It is coordinated and run by The Bible Society. I currently head up a team of six volunteers and we go into Whimple School once a fortnight to take their assemblies. We perform on a Thursday and rehearse on the Tuesday before. I am learning the ropes at the moment but I would like to establish more teams so we can take Open The Book to other schools in our Mission Community.

We are always greatly encouraged by the response of the children. As I was leaving the school the other day one of the children came up to me unprompted and said

"Thank you for your stories. I really like them"

During Advent I led "Advent Quiet Space" on Tuesday evenings, and I am planning to hold a similar a series of Compline services (evening prayer) during Lent. This will also be on a weekday evening. All these services allow for times of quiet reflection, and this is something I would like to develop further. In a world that seems to be increasingly noisy and dominated by social media I would like the church to be an oasis. A place where those who would not normally step through the doors of a church can find peace and experience the presence of God.

Not everything I do is church related. Jesus calls us to be salt and light to those around us. I go into Whimple School on a Friday morning to hear children read and occasionally teach origami on their craft afternoons. Once a fortnight I help out at the Cranbrook Food Bank. We are all carriers of Jesus' joy and peace, and as we share our lives and interests with those we meet, we act as witnesses to him.


