
And Finally we have received notice of increased printing costs that we need to absorb. We will see how this progresses, and may have to review the inclusion of colour centre pages as a result.

All welcome

Is the church in Talaton in good hands?

I guess everyone that wants to live in a small village wants it to have a shop, a pub, and a church, and so we are very well served here in Talaton. As well as being a place of worship, we all also want the church to look good, and to be welcoming when anyone wants to use it. St James the Great, our church, is managed by the small group of local people who all live in the village, known as the Parochial Church Council - a very old name for what is basically a committee which supports the priest in his duties, and looks after the building and grounds. Last month we reported on the old clock which has been restored and now has pride of place in the main body of the church, and this month we're reporting on the excellent work on the churchyard done in March by volunteers in the village. Thank you so much to them! You might also like to know about the other repairs and improvements we have underway, hopefully coming to fruition this year: The biggest project, which will entail the church being closed for a couple of months, probably in the summer, is to see the interior completely redecorated, with new lighting being installed which will enable us to

highlight the incredible beauty of the ceiling; the large wooden screen that divides the altar area from the main part of the church; and various

other treasures which are to a degree lost on the shadows now. Sometime later, we hope to bring the church heating up to todays standards. Last year we had to deal with an outbreak of dry rot, and unfortunately we now have another outbreak to deal with - this time we are taking steps to ensure it can't happen again!

Already this year we have replaced the north gate with a new one, made to be very similar to the old but beautiful one which was falling apart! We've also done a major repair on a chancel window, which was in danger of falling out, and will shortly be starting a major restoration of the rest of our stained glass windows. We've repaired the lovely table top grave close to the church entrance. We've had to manage a significant collapse of part of the boundary bank in Deep Lane, and we continue to work with the adjacent farm whilst a satisfactory solution can be put in place. We are in the process of having a replica made of the lamp which usually sits above the iron arch by the main gate - we hope it will look the same, and last many more decades!

We're making arrangements to have the bell ringing chamber open when the church is open, to enable visitors to see the lovely, invaluable, wall coverings which currently are hidden away from view - to do this we have to make the bell ropes secure, and ensure that the steps up the tower are securely locked!

To top it all, one of the large ornamental crosses on the roof has become loose, and needs urgent repair!

None of this comes cheaply, but we think it right that we continue to keep our church in good order, despite the challenges of dealing with the authorities on what is after all a Grade 1 listed building, as well as our church! We have in the last 12 months or so, raised just short of £20,000 from various charitable bodies towards the costs of the work we detailed here, recognising that our building expenses continue regardless of what goes on around us.

As a result of all this work, the community, and visitors from outside the area, have access to a most historic and beautiful building that is there to be enjoyed by all. We do encourage you to visit, no appointment necessary - just wander in, walk and look around, maybe even sit and soak up the peace and beauty. It's open every day in daylight hours.



Talaton Parish Council Report

The following are major items from the minutes but a full copy of the minutes may be viewed on both Parish Noticeboards and on the Parish Web site www.talatonparishcouncil.co.uk

Meeting 6th April 2022

Public Fifteen-minute open Forum- 1 resident attended to talk about the repeat noise survey at Escot. Graham Rooms along with the project manager and ops director from Voneus attended to give details of the plans and road closures that will take place during the roll out of the new Fibre Broadband that is due within the next 12 weeks. The Chairman spoke of the great commitment from Graham as he first started the project in 2016. There are still one or two issues with the roll out but residents will be kept informed as to what is happening. Details of the road closures will be notified nearer the time.

Cllr Skinner spoke of the difficult times that we are facing in East Devon with the rising costs of Council Tax, car parking, adult social care and the general everyday rising costs. He went on to talk about the various proposed solar farms in the area and if they were all going to supply the Broadclyst sub station then what is the capacity at Broadclyst. He spoke of the need for a balance between energy versus farming and where these sites fit in the land. He said a debate was needed at Council to discuss the matter as all the applications were coming in at 49 megawatts whereas anything over that would be decided at Government level.

To consider Planning Application 22/0623/FUL – 3 Talaton Farm Barns – installation of air source heat pump and removal of external oil boiler – After a discussion, the Council took a vote with a unanimous decision to support the application. Proposed by Cllr Lenehan, seconded by Cllr Hawkins. Comment to be submitted to EDDC – The PC fully supports this application.

The PC favours the change away from oil to a renewable energy source.

Parish Maintenance-

- Rydon Farm through to Blue Anchor potholes have finally been patched.
- Pothole various potholes from top of Rydon hill down past the cottages to the bottom of the dip
- Potholes
 – between Russett House and Lees Meadow in the middle of the road
- Potholes between the gate at Riverwood (Roman Road) up to the bottom of the wooded strip
- Drain collapsing on the left-hand side coming from Fairmile towards Escot near the first dip Larkbeare- speak to Highways Officer as road still eroding

Items for information only or discussion on the next agenda – Dog bin- a resident witnessed a car stopping and leaving a bag of dog poo by the bin. Car registration and make passed to Environmental Health and a fixed penalty fine is due to be issued by EDDC.; Allotments – the new tenants are making great progress with their allotment. Barry Kingdon is in the process of finishing hanging the new gates and putting up extra top wires & mesh and it is a great improvement.

Date of next meeting- will be the Annual Meeting of the Parish Council on Wednesday 4th May 2022

TALATON NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH

Every year we review our neighbourhood watch scheme. In preparation for the Annual Parish Meeting this year we thought we would tell you how this last year has fared, any changes there have been and try to encourage more people to join in.

What's happened this year ? (1/4/2021 - 31/03/2022)

Over the previous 5 whole calendar years the reported crime totals for the year have been 20, 20, 24 and 18 but this last year the figure dropped again to 16. The only change in pattern is the peak, if you can call 6 a peak, occurred in August with crimes centred around Beautiful Days. With so little crime there are no clear trends other than to say we remain a remarkably safe place to live. By comparison Cranbrook recorded between 22 and 49 per month last year and the small district of North Walworth in London we know well recorded 326 in August 2021 alone.

We have given advice about 19 matters this year, referring 7 of them to the police. This is a decrease from 25 and 23 respectively the previous year.

We have reviewed 178 alerts from the police and passed 15 of those on to some or all members of the scheme. This compares to 167 and 16 the previous year.

6 appeals have been placed on our page of the parish web site compared with 10 before.

What's changed?


We have had some contact with our Ottery Rural policing team this year but it's clear their focus is on busier parts of their patch stretching from Cowley to Feniton. Bob Abraham has stepped down from looking after Escot and Fairmile and Mike and Carol Needham have taken his place. Links to useful resources have been kept up to date on our page of the parish web site covering topics such as; how to report dog fouling, the address to forward scam emails to, where to get fraud protection advice, a site advising older drivers and their families on keeping on the road safely for longer, how to report matters anonymously to the police, and many other topics. In Memory of our Father John Carter

John Carter passed away on 4th April 2022 after a period in Musgrave Park Hospital, Taunton. He was 85 and had suffered a stroke from which he never recovered.

John was a farmer, formerly at Lashbrook Farm where he farmed out door pigs, sheep and arable.

In his many years as a resident of Talaton he was involved along with my Mother Dawn, in many village events.

He was Chairman of the Parish Council and among his achievements he was a prime mover getting the Moor safeguarded and Registered as a Village Green. He also secured the triangle of woods at Beacon as amenity land. He was also Chairman of the Talaton Parish Hall, and both of these positions he held for a number of years.

He was one of the main people involved in setting up Village Day, which was started on the Queens Silver Jubilee on the first Saturday in June, becoming an annual event which village folk and outsiders looked forward to each year. He rarely missed one after moving away.

He was a key instigator in setting up the Community Shop in 1993 which opened the following year and was its first chairman. In 1997 he was presented with an award for the best Community Enterprise in the South West, which was presented by H.R.H. Prince Charles. The shop has since gone from strength to strength and is a real hub in the village.

Along with my mother, and us as children, he took on plenty of Pantomime Characters, doing this for many years, going back to 1970's when Ted and Diana Spencer wrote and directed the plays. They were still involved after they left the village.

There were many Pantomime parties at Lashbrook along with barn dances, jazz and folk night held as part of Honiton Round Table, of which he was a member. He organised tyre rolling contests across the fields at Lashbrook, and some villagers wil remember these, and always with a knees-up afterwards.

The farm was a busy one with Dad taking on students from Seale Hayne College of Agriculture and vet students, all doing a stint as part of their training. Also children from under privileged backgrounds came to camp on the farm – they went to different farms in the village each day to learn how to milk cows and feed animals etc., myself and my sisters also did our share over the years too. Mum keeping everyone fed and watered and lending a hand on the farm.

Later at Lashbrook they built a new farm house and added a farm shop in the later years. Dad was well known for his scrumptious pork produce, and along with Mum they ran this and farmers markets in local towns. Some local folk may remember helping with the potatoe harvesting. So many happy times with picnic lunches and laughter, but hard work too!

He was a Magistrate for Honiton and District for thirty years.

After retirement he began writing more and more and wrote a book of Country Poetry and one about the Farmers life with a fox. He also wrote his auto biography "Journey into Farming." He loved jotting down his thoughts mainly as poetry.

A Pillar of the Community in Talaton and later in Yarcombe, to where he retired having farmed there before moving to Talaton.

He wil be sadly missed by his wife Dawn, his daughters Robin, Sally - Ann, and Ruth. His five grandchildren and two great grand children, and many others who knew him.

About Young Community Theatre 4All

Following the highly successful Community Theatre 4All production of "Joseph and the Amazing Technicolor Dreamcoat" in March 2020 when a cast of 30 adults were joined by 20 children it was obvious that we needed to open a group for younger members. After a long pause, caused by Covid, the children's group was formed in October 2021 and gave their first performance of an original piece based upon the children's book "Where the Wild Things Are" by Maurice Sendak.

Next year the group will be working on a major piece of children's musical theatre called "Rats!" – an up-beat retelling of the story of "The Pied Piper of Hamlyn". Rehearsals for this show will begin in October.

For children who wish to be involved in "Rats!" this is the time to join the group, to come and make friends and discover what working with Frances and me is like. In the months of May, June and July the group will meet in Talaton Parish Hall from 4.30 to 5.30 on the first Tuesday of the month. Each of these summer sessions will be independent of the others, so if your son/daughter is unable to attend one of the sessions that is not a problem. There will be no meetings in August or September and from October the group will meet every Tuesday in Talaton Parish Hall, initially from 4.30 to 5.30 but then as rehearsals develop the group will go on to 6.00pm. There will be no charge for the Summer Term 'Taster Sessions' but in the Autumn and Spring terms there will be a charge of £25 per term to cover hall hire fees and contribute towards the production expenses.

Young Community Theatre 4All is lead by Tom and Frances Samson, both experienced retired teachers. Tom was a Drama and Theatre teacher and both Tom and Frances have enhanced DBS clearance.

For this project the group will be joined by Julia Green. Julia is well known and respected for her musical work in Whimple, the surrounding villages and in Exeter.



Rainfall at the Cobblers in Talaton during March

The first part of March was rather unsettled with a cold first week. There was then a week of milder weather with plenty of warm and dry days. From the 10^{th} / 16^{th} we had lots of rain in fact 54mls or over 2 inches, Then we had a very dry patch and from the 17^{th} till 28^{th} not a drop fell. The latter part of the month was cold and frosty.

The total rainfall for March was 3.3 inches.

The Met Office tells us that mean temperature for the UK was slightly higher than average, and most areas had only 58% of expected rain. Sunshine hours were up with 152% of normal, this made this March the 2nd sunniest since 1929!

A maximum temperature of 20.8C was recorded in St. James's Park, London on 23rd and at Treknow in Cornwall on the 25th The coldest place in UK was Aboyne in Scotland with -9.1C on 2nd. During the 24 hours of the 2nd over 2 inches of rain fell on White Barrow in Devon! 10 centimetres of snow fell on Copley in Durham on the 31st.

Here in Talaton 84ms or 3,3 inches of rain fell during the month, there were 19 days with no rain, of which 12 days between the 17^{th} and 28^{th} which were consecutively dry; we had 5 nights of frost.

Our Total rainfall so far this year is 5.96 inches.

At the time of writing chill winds are whipping around Talaton accompanied by the odd flurry of snow flakes a few days ago, but Spring flowers are looking lovely, with tulips, bluebells and fritillaries are beginning to take over from the daffodils and crocuses.

To help maintain a good show of bulbs next year, do dead head your bulbs when they have finished flowering, unless you want to collect seed, but whatever you do, let the leaves continue to make food to fatten the bulbs.

May is the month when the growing season really begins in earnest, so now is the time to use the extra hours of daylight to make our gardens as productive and beautiful as we can. Hopefully the chilly winds and frosty nights have gone, but there is no guarantee, so don't be too impatient to plant out tender crops such as runner beans and courgettes and do take care to harden them off first.

Pest alert

The fresh young growth of veg crops are tasty and appealing to more than just us, so do look out for competitors and remove them. Little animals such as aphids are great opportunists. They have girl power and will clone masses of look alikes in a very short time. If the conditions are perfect, they don't have to waste time looking for mates! Garlic spray is meant to deter them and if you have been encouraging bluetits and their close relatives into your garden all winter, they will reward you by eating a substantial number.



Lily beetles and vine weevils are already active. Removing these animals as soon as you see them is the best way to keep them under control so it is good to do a daily check for adult fily beetles on fritillaries and lifies. Being bright red, fily beetles are easy to spot, but cleverly drop off plants, land upside down on the soil and are then much harder to spot. So hunt carefully!



NO MOW MAY

In 2020 citizen scientists, who took part in Plantlife's Every Flower Counts - the largest ever survey of the humble lawn, helped to reveal not only an astonishing diversity of wild flowers growing in British lawns, but also that simple changes in mowing can result in the production of enough nectar for ten times more bees and other pollinators. This after doing no more than leaving the mower in the shed for the whole of May. Last year we asked if villagers would join this venture, not just to help collect worthwhile data, but to find out what is actually growing in your lawn other than grass. This May we would like to encourage you again to be brave enough to leave at least a patch of your lawn unmown for the



whole of May this year and see how many flowers bloom in your patch once you cease chopping their heads off. If you are feeling a bit squeamish about desecrating your 'perfect' lawn, try thinking of it as having a pop-up, temporary flower bed; how about a metre square, or a heart shape? Pollinators will be happy and you are almost certain to see the equally happy faces of lawn daisies, clover and the remnants of lesser celandine to name but a few.

You could decorate your no mow area with Scaremows to remind manic mowers in your family to keep off the 'grass'.

At the end of the month, join with Plantlife's nationwide "Every Flower Counts" survey to discover how many bees your lawn can feed. Not only will you receive your very own "nectar score" - which will tell you how many bees your lawn can feed - it will also help Plantlife learn more about the health of Britain's wildflowers.






