At the time of writing, we have been enjoying a few days of exceptionally hot and sunny weather, so who knows, but





# **Talaton Parish Council Report**

### TALATON PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

The following are major items from the minutes but a full copy of the minutes may be viewed on both Parish Noticeboards and on the Parish Web site www.talatonparishcouncil.co.uk

# PARISH MAINTENANCE: ITEMS REQUIRING ATTENTION AND UPDATE ON ITEMS REPORTED

- i. The abandoned DCC highway sign near the Newtown Junction had now been collected by DCC
- ii. Cllr Walker reported that all the potholes at Fairmile had been filled in. However there was a large pothole opposite Hillside (and as cars were parked on the other side of the road, it meant vehicles could not avoid it). There were a number of potholes in the vicinity of Escot. The Clerk would report these matters to DCC
- iii. DCC had advised that the defective road markings/signs from Talaton Cross to Beacon Cross had been reported to the local neighbourhood highway team who would organise repairs subject to the repairs meeting their current policy
- iv. It was AGREED that the Clerk contact National Rail to request that the vegetation growing out from the base of the railway bridge (leading from Beacon Cross to the allotments) needed trimming back
- v. It was AGREED that the Clerk report to DCC the damaged wall at the layby at Orchard Close
- vi. It was AGREED that the Clerk report to DCC the issue of ornaments being sited on a highway verge

#### UPDATE RE BARCLAYS BANK

The online banking system was now fully operational which should make the paying of invoices easier and quicker for the Council, plus it would be easier to check balances/statements



EDDC had enquired as to the condition of the oak tree on the Moor, as several trees it had provided to various parishes had died. It was pleasing to note that the tree was thriving thanks to those parishioners who had kept the tree well watered in its initial stages of growth. However it was understood that the tree plaque had been damaged. Cllr Bos agreed to research the cost of a similar replacement sign.

### DEVELOPMENT MANAGEMENT EDDC

The Clerk had contacted Mr Freeman to obtain clarification on the likelihood of any future development in the village. He had provided a comprehensive response which included the following:- 'There could be various ways in which new development could come forward in Talaton despite it being a rural area and there being no built up area boundary around the village. There are permitted development rights that allow barns to be converted to dwellings in rural areas without even needing planning permission in certain circumstances. Rural workers dwellings can also be allowed under our policies but these are not just for farmers but could be for a whole range of rural workers including those engaged in forestry and other rural based enterprises'

#### UPDATE ON WATER LEAK OPPOSITE THE PARISH HALL

The leak had been registered with SWW on its website and DCC had advised that its Enforcement Officer would also investigate. The Clerk was still waiting to hear from DCC with an update despite chasing further

# ALLOTMENTS UPDATE - ANY ACTIONS TO BE AGREED; CONSIDERATION AND APPROVAL (IF APPROPRIATE) OF ANY QUOTES RECEIVED AND APPROVAL OF DRAFT DOCUMENTS

All the draft lease documentation prepared by the Clerk had been approved by the Council. The Clerk would now submit the draft lease and plan for consideration/approval to the landowners. New tenancy agreements, rules and regulations and other necessary documents had been prepared by the Clerk and were also approved by the Council. It was also agreed to increase the allotment plot fees slightly and also charge an administrative fee for all the documentation that would be issued to the allotment tenants in due course. It was agreed that the matter of the water supply, be further considered when the Clerk had heard from SWW regarding the PC's request to either connect into SWW's existing water supply pipe or use the tap/hose sited near the gateway of the treatment works. The quote for the installation of a new pipe had been circulated to all councillors but it was noted that the survey costs and the digging of a trench for the pipe would be additional costs.

# LAND REGISTRY UPDATE RE COMPULSORY REGISTRATION REQUIREMENTS


The Land Registry had advised that it had now revised its strategic intent for delivering a comprehensive register within the time frames previously stated. The reason for this was to ease the pressure on operational resource and ensure appropriate focus was delivered to reducing the backlog and improve the speed of service to its customers. Thus there was currently no obligation for the Council to apply to the Land Registry for voluntary first registration of any of its unregistered land

# Boat Building on the Moor



Recently fifteen Retired Old Boys of Talaton added to their hugely varied programme with a visit to a Dartmoor boat builder! Yes, boats on Dartmoor! Not any boat builder but an incredibly talented craftsman. Roger and Lyn Wickham and their son Oliver live on nearly five acres of idyllic intentionally created wilderness on the east side of the moor. From within workshops in that peaceful setting Roger, with help from Oliver, produces a variety of craft. Finished and partially finished models were evidence of the careful jointing, sanding, steaming, and coating of the timber that only a craftsman could produce.

Roger entered the Merchant Navy as a sixteen-year-old cadet and rose through the ranks to second mate serving on a vast array of craft and experiencing the world at a time when perhaps the spirit of adventure had not been squashed by the dreaded Health and Safety! Some of his tales certainly portrayed a time of excitement. He served on pre-container cargo ships and on what were probably the last steam powered carriers to shuttle freight around the world. In his early twenties he moved to more lucrative work on Oil tank-

ers and during one contract was hit on the port bow in the night by a wayward Greek cargo ship, this didn't seem to lessen his love of the

sea and sailing.

At the age of twenty five Roger decided to end his emerging career in the merchant marine and embarked on a round world sailing adventure with a friend. His first main break of the voyage was



in the British Virgin Islands, it was here on the Caribbean Island of Tortola he settled, then set up a marine services business, met his future wife Lyn and where they raised three children.

Roger and Lyn returned to the UK for the children's secondary education and it was here in Devon he was able to continue his love of boatbuilding. His skills allowed him to undertake other commissions and his work is in evidence in the homes of some of the rich and famous. Not satisfied with just yachts, dinghies, canoes and all that



sail but the construction of a plane is in progress. We saw videos of the stages in its manufacture including the engine fitting and trials.

In spite of probably being able to listen and look for a lot longer it has to be said that the news was out that a cream tea awaited

in the garden and what an end to a magical visit - a homemade cream tea, in the sunshine looking out over the wonderful wilderness.





### Choir set to pull out all the stops for a beautiful night of Baroque music



Exeter Philharmonic Choir will join forces with the Isca Ensemble and four talented young soloists for November's 'Music of the Baroque' concert in Exeter Cathedral, including Handel's outstandingly beautiful choral work *Dixit Dominus*.

The concert promises to be a particularly memorable event for choir member Sheena McCready, whose musician son, Fergus, will take centre stage playing the solo of Alessandro

Marcello's *Oboe Concerto in D minor*. Fergus McCready took up the oboe as a child following a voice trial at Exeter Cathedral, where his brother was a chorister. It was Exeter Philharmonic Choir's Associate Director of Music, Stephen Tanner, who suggested Fergus try the woodwind instrument and he hasn't looked back!

In the past year, Fergus has auditioned as Principal Oboe with Birmingham Royal Ballet, the City of Birmingham Symphony Orchestra and the Royal Opera House, resulting in trials with all three orchestras. Fergus has also played guest Principal with the BBC Symphony Orchestra, Philharmonia Orchestra and the Academy of St Martins in The Fields. Sheena McCready, who has sung with the Choir for many years, says, "I'm absolutely thrilled that Fergus will be playing in our 'Music of the Baroque' concert in November. I'd always hoped he might one day play



alongside the Choir, although I never dreamt he would be playing one of my favourite concertos as a soloist.

"It feels like we've come full circle as Fergus took up the oboe after playing his recorder to Stephen many years ago during a voice trial. November 4th will be a very special night for me and, I hope, for the audience too." Howard Ionascu, Exeter Philharmonic Choir's Director of Music, adds, "The choir's main work (and challenge!) is *Dixit Dominus*. For me, it sits alongside *Messiah* as one of Handel's sublime choral works. We will be joined by three outstanding professional soloists - sopranos Lucy Cronin and Ellie Sperling, a former Exeter Cathedral chorister, and also Martha McLorina.

"The concert will also include the familiar anthem *Zadok the Priest*, sung recently at the King's Coronation and at the crowning of monarchs throughout the centuries, and Vivaldi's popular *Gloria*. That sums up the concert really - an evening of glorious Baroque music." At full strength, Exeter Philharmonic Choir has around 100 members, and the Isca Ensemble has more than 65 experienced amateurs and some former professional players drawn from across the South West. Isca Ensemble Musical Director Roger Hendy says, "We are delighted to have this opportunity of teaming up with Exeter Philharmonic Choir to present what promises to be a very special Autumn programme of beautiful Baroque music."

### TALATON PARISH HALL HIRE CHARGES

Main Hall £10 per hour Committee Room £5 per hour

Minimum hiring period is 2 hours and this includes setting up and clearing away. There is no additional charge for use of the kitchen or stage. A deposit is not required but the hirer will be expected to pay for breakages or any repairs required resulting from damage during the hiring period.

All the above are per day.

In addition to the hiring fee a deposit is required for gazebo hire which will be returned if the items are returned in the same condition as that at the start of the hire period. The deposit for the 6mx3m gazebos is £100 and the 3mx3m gazebos is £50. Cutlery, China, cutlery and glasses must be washed prior to return.

### HALL DETAILS

The Village Hall is ideal for all manner of occasions, including meetings, luncheon and dinner events, wedding parties, children's parties, fairs and concerts and exercise classes.

# Rainfall at the Cobblers/Parish Hall 100 Club

# Rainfall at the Cobblers in Talaton During July & August

July was an unsettled month, cool, dull and with a lot of rain, in stark contrast to June, when the rainfall was less than an inch and July had over 5 inches.

The temperature over the UK were below average with a warn spell around  $7^{th}$  /9<sup>th</sup> when temperatures just reached 30C for one day, but with most places not reaching even that. Rainfall was well above average with many places in Ireland, Devon and Dorset having more than 200% over of what was normal.

The UK overall rainfall was 170% of the average, making this July the 6<sup>th</sup> wettest since 2009. Sunshine was also in short supply being particularly dull across Southern and Western areas.

A maximum temperature of 30  $^{\circ}$ C was recorded for one day on the 7th In Chertsey in Surrey. And the Lowest of 1.20 $^{\circ}$ C at Lochglascarnoch in the Scottish Highlands on the 26th. On the 23rd 110.9 mm or 4.4 inches of rain fell in 24 hours at White Barrows in Devon!!

Here in Talaton we had only 9 days with no rain the rest of the month produced 132mms or 5.2 inches bringing our total for the year to a grand 20.6 inches.

### Report on the weather in Talaton during August.

According to the Met Office August was rather a mixed month. It certainly was here in Talaton. Low pressure dominated the whole of the UK with brief spells of settled weather interspaced with showers. There were 2 named storms, Antoni on the  $5^{th}$  which here in Talaton brought us 26.5ms or just over an inch, and storm Betty on  $18/19^{th}$  only 8.5ms or 0.3 inches.

Over the whole of the UK the mean temperature was 0.2 C degrees above the average, rainfall was variable and sunshine was slightly below average. It was rather dull across the Southwest and Wales with only 79% of normal sunshine.

A maximum temperature of 28.4 C was recorded at Wellesbourne in Warwickshire on  $16^{th}$  and the lowest of 1.4 C at Altnaharra in Scotland on the  $6^{th}$ .

Here in Talaton we also had the mix of sunshine and showers. There were 15 days when no rain fell. 75ms or 3 inches of rain fell in August which gives us the total for the year of 22.6 inches.
